Our Most Successful Matching Challenge Ever!

Convention saw our 6th Annual Matching Challenge, where 41 extremely generous graduate members agreed to match donations made over the weekend by young and first-time donors. This year a record 86 young donors contributed over \$2,800! Overall, this year's Matching Challenge raised over \$34,000 in support of our Literary and Educational endeavors. Thanks to our many generous donors, we were able to Accept 100% of requests for reduced rates at Convention, offer several professional development webinars for all members, and seed our pilot year of financial aid for Undergraduates!

Taking a Pie for the Phi!

At the close of the Saturday banquet, Jenny Flanagan, Middletown '83, Michael Sugarman, Binghamton '18, and Jack Kelly, Brunonian '18 sacrificed their faces to take part in everyone's favorite aspect of the matching challenge: getting delicious whipped cream pies smashed into their faces.

The Emerald and Pearl Award recognizes outstanding contributions to the Alpha Delta Phi Society at the National level, and secondarily, exemplary contributions to the member's chapter. The Rising Star Award was recently introduced at our 2018 Convention to recognize young leaders of the Society who are making significant contributions to the organization. The Star and Crescent Award is awarded by the Society Board of Governors to a graduate member who has made an outstanding and lasting contribution to the Society; it is the highest distinction bestowed upon a graduate member of the Society.
